Recognizing Indigenous Land, Knowledge, and Pedagogy

The London Children's Museum is a settler organization located on the traditional territories of the Anishinaabeg, Haudenosaunee, Lunaapeewak, and Attawandaron Peoples. We recognize the unbroken presence of the Chippewas of the Thames First Nation, Oneida Nation of the Thames, Munsee-Delaware Nation, and an urban Indigenous population who continue to steward and care for this land.

As a museum dedicated to hands-on, immersive learning, we acknowledge that Indigenous Peoples are the original teachers of these approaches. Indigenous pedagogy, rooted in land-based, experiential ways of knowing, honours children as whole beings with mental, emotional, spiritual, and physical dimensions. These teachings remind us that learning is not an individual pursuit, but a lifelong, collective process, nurtured in communion with all living things.

Learning is experiential. Learning is observational. Learning is relational. This pedagogy shapes how we understand curiosity, discovery, and our interconnectedness with the world around us.

We recognize Indigenous brilliance: the deep knowledge systems, creativity, and innovation that have shaped this land. As both a museum and educational institution, the London Children's Museum has benefited from First Nation and Inuit traditional knowledge and material culture. From physical artifacts to knowledge and practice, we recognize the many ways Indigenous excellence has informed exhibits and programs over our organization's 48-year history.

We loudly affirm that **Every Child Matters.** We honour the Anishinaabe teaching of mino-bimaadiziwin (the Good Life), as one of the many Indigenous ways of knowing and being that reminds us that every child is sacred, unique, and entitled to a life of balance, holistic health, and purpose.

The London Children's Museum is committed to walking this journey in partnership with Indigenous communities, amplifying Indigenous voices in our programs, and ensuring that generations of families learn in ways that reflect the land, stories, and wisdom of the First Peoples of Turtle Island.

This past year has been a landmark chapter in the 48-year history of the London Children's Museum, as we completed our **long-awaited journey home to 100 Kellogg Lane.** This incredible project was completed alongside our treasured community members: the friends, visitors, donors, staff, board members, construction managers, architects, engineers, exhibit designers and fabricators, skilled tradespeople, artists, and countless professionals whose commitment made this new home possible.

This year, unlike any other, was filled with milestones. In November 2024, we said farewell to our longtime home at 21 Wharncliffe Road. Once Riverview Public School, it had been our home since 1982. We continue to honour this space, which lives on in the hearts of more than three million visitors.

By December, we welcomed donors and members to preview our new home at 100 Kellogg Lane. Though the closure was brief, the move reflected more than a decade of preparation and hard work. Thanks to our team's commitment, children continued to play and learn with minimal interruption.

In January 2025, we officially cut the ribbon and opened our doors to the wider community. The next few months were a whirlwind for staff and our many visitors! This year, we welcomed an unprecedented 202,000 visitors, far surpassing our projections and filling our new home with memories, joy, and deep learning.



It was the community that made this journey possible. When we hosted consultations, you came forward to share your ideas. When we invited children to imagine the new space, you lent their voices to the vision. When we put out an urgent appeal last fall to help us open our doors on time, you responded with extraordinary generosity.

Because of you, families poured through our doors at 100 Kellogg Lane to explore, discover, and play together.

As we look ahead to the coming year, we are launching a **new strategic plan.** We pledge to continue listening to the community. **Your needs**, **your ideas**, and your hopes will continue to shape this space.

After all, this is *your* museum. Throughout this journey, our vision remains the same: to create a space where every child can explore, discover, and experience the joyful power of play. **Families need this now more than ever.**

Campaign Update

Our journey to 100 Kellogg Lane began over a decade ago. Though our longtime home at 21 Wharncliffe Rd S was beloved, the building could no longer support the needs of today's families. A new home was needed, one that could offer handson, innovative programs and exhibits, designed for a new generation of learners.

In 2018, the London Children's Museum secured a new location at **100 Kellogg Lane**, a site that met every need identified by our community. Centrally located, accessible, and rich in history, this arts and entertainment destination offered 21-foot ceilings, a single-level open-concept floor plan, and room to grow.

Working with museum master planners at Gyroscope Inc., we spent a year consulting with families, educators, accessibility advocates, and community partners about what the new London Children's Museum needed to be. From those conversations emerged **Wonderoots and Creative Shoots**, a conceptual framework that celebrates this organization's deep history, while fostering creative growth.

Over several years, this vision was realized through the efforts of our **remarkable design and construction partners**: michael + clark construction, Cornerstone Architecture, Vanderwesten and Rutherford Associates Inc., Reich + Petch Design International, SKOLNICK Architecture + Design Partnership, kubik maltbie, Boss Display, Rockscapes of Canada, and many others.

Despite delays and rising costs during the pandemic, our team and community rose to the challenge. Today, the new London Children's Museum stands as a \$23 million community-built project. With only **\$2 million remaining** to complete the campaign and naming opportunities still available, we are confident this final goal will be reached.

We would like to extend a special thank you to our friends and partners at 100 Kellogg Lane, visionary leaders, Martha Leach and Paul McLaughlin.

Together, we have built something extraordinary, a space designed by and for children, where everyone can explore, learn, and belong.

Strategic Plan in Action

Priority 1: We commit to equity, accessibility, and inclusion.

For nearly 50 years, the London Children's Museum has worked to remove barriers and make play-based learning **accessible** to every child and family.

When planning our new home at 100 Kellogg Lane, we asked our community what mattered most. Families, educators, and community advocates told us the same thing: accessibility comes first.

Their voices guided our design. The new museum is built on a single, open-concept level to support full mobility and ease of movement. Wide corridors, automatic doors, step-free transitions, and barrier-free washrooms work to create a space that feels easy, safe, and dignified.

Community feedback shaped exhibit design. In Unearthed, an accessible dig pit was built into the heart of the exhibit.

In Community Roots, houses were sized to accommodate child-sized mobility devices. Lighting and audio levels were designed to be adjustable, allowing us to tailor the environment for Sensory Friendly Evenings.

Families also shared a need for quiet and care-focused spaces. New infant care and quiet rooms provide private spaces for feeding, prayer, meditation, or simply catching one's breath.

We're so grateful to every community member who contributed to this space.

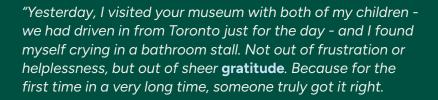

Community Voices

Priority 1: We commit to equity, accessibility, and inclusion.



As a mother to two amazing kids - including my incredible son Ashton, who has complex needs - I've grown used to navigating spaces that simply weren't designed with families like mine in mind. But yesterday was different. Our visit to the London Children's Museum left me feeling seen, supported, and deeply moved.

I'm also a child psychologist, and I want you to know how profoundly meaningful it was to witness your thoughtful approach to accessibility and inclusion. This wasn't just about checking boxes - it was clear that every detail was created with intention, empathy, and a deep understanding of what many children and families truly need.

From private and accessible stalls to child and adult change tables in the Companion Aide Stall - every element told a story of dignity and respect. Your non-gendered washrooms honoured all bodies and identities. The absence of automatic hand dryers - something that can be overwhelming for kids with sensory sensitivities - was such a gift. For once, I didn't have to change my growing child on a bathroom floor or navigate spaces that overlook the realities of disability. Ashton had a quiet, respectful, inclusive space. And I wept with gratitude.

And then we found the quiet room - a lowsensory sanctuary where Ashton could pause, reset, and regulate. So could I. That room wasn't just helpful. It was healing.

Thank you for creating more than just a museum. You created a space that quietly and powerfully said, 'You belong here. Ashton belongs here.' And we felt that. Truly."

Strategic Plan in Action

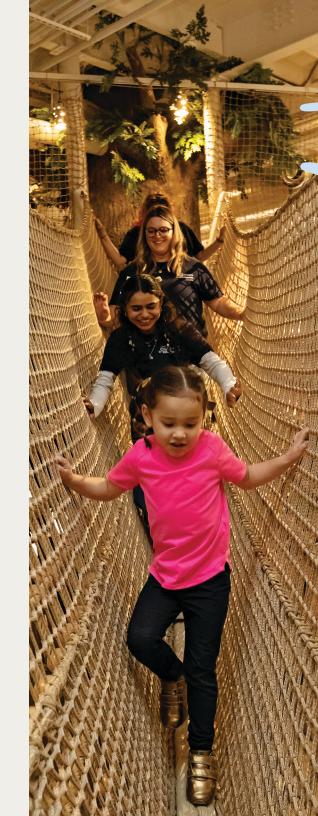
Priority 2: Through advocacy and awareness, we influence the way the community views, values, and respects children and play.

At the London Children's Museum, we believe that when we truly listen to children, communities grow stronger.

In May 2025, Executive Director Kate Ledgley travelled to Albuquerque, New Mexico, to participate in the Association of Children's Museums' annual conference, presenting alongside peers from across North America. The session, Transforming Spaces: The Journey of Renovating and Building a Children's Museum, explored **how children's voices can shape inclusive cultural spaces**.

Kate shared what our community taught us throughout our ten-year journey: Children are insightful contributors, families want to be partners in the process, and community spaces can be designed alongside the people they serve. She highlighted how more than 500 children and families influenced decisions at every stage of the museum design process.

The London Children's Museum will continue this work by **listening closely, cultivating meaningful relationships, and sharing what we learn** so that more children and communities can benefit from spaces designed to meet their needs.







Community Voices

Priority 2: Through advocacy and awareness, we influence the way the community views, values, and respects children and play.

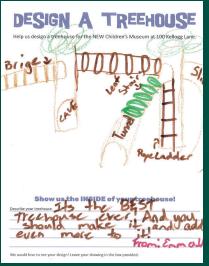
When designing the new London Children's Museum, we turned to the experts: children. Through drawings, conversations, workshops, and feedback stations, more than 500 children, caregivers, and community members helped shape the kind of museum they wanted to belong to.

We asked children to imagine a treehouse for our Branching Out exhibit and share what it should feel like, sound like, and look like. In Community Roots, we asked, "What do you see in your community?". When exploring exhibit themes, we invited children to tell us what they love and what they are curious about.

Their ideas, ranging from big and whimsical to practical and profound, influenced everything from the floor plan to exhibit choices and even colour choices. What you see in our galleries today is not just a design decision, but a collection of community voices brought to life.

These examples, and many more throughout the museum, are reminders that when we listen to children, we build spaces where everyone belongs.
